


Project Brief & Funding Statement



1st Haslemere Scout Group New Scout Headquarters at Scotland Park, Haslemere.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Objective

The primary objective of the New Scout Headquarters project is to provide the 1st Haslemere Scout Group with a dedicated and modern facility situated in Scotland Park, Haslemere. This facility will serve as a central headquarters, fostering the growth and development of local scouts and enhancing their scouting experience. Additionally, the project aims to contribute to the wider Haslemere community by providing a versatile community hall space for local groups and events.

Goals

- 1. Scout Empowerment: Create a purpose-built headquarters equipped to support the needs of the 1st Haslemere Scout Group, offering a conducive environment for meetings, activities, and storage of scouting equipment.
- 2. Community Engagement: Establish a community hall within the headquarters that will serve as a hub for local groups and events, promoting social cohesion and inclusivity within the Haslemere South area.
- 3. Collaborative Funding: Secure funding from a diverse range of sources, including local and national grant organisations, community fundraising efforts, and in-kind contributions, to ensure the financial sustainability of the project.

Solution

- Collaborate with local businesses and residents for voluntary expertise, fostering a sense of community ownership and involvement.
- Engage with potential capital grant funding organisations with outline planning permission to secure commitments for the project.
- Utilise a combination of existing funds, community-driven fundraising events, and sponsorship initiatives by the 1st Haslemere Scout Group.

Project Outline

The New Scout Headquarters project will be situated on approximately 8 acres of woodland adjacent to new houses in Scotland Park, Haslemere. The land and woods, generously provided by Redwood (South West) Ltd. as freehold, will be owned by the 1st Haslemere Scout Group and held in trust by the Scouts Association Trust Corporation. The housing developer will construct the "Shell & Core" of the headquarters, while the scouts will manage and fund the "second fix" to make the building operational and fit for purpose.

The project includes the installation of necessary fittings, such as structural elements, utilities, interior finishes, scout-specific features, community hall amenities, security, safety measures, accessibility features, and landscaping. The budget estimates have been compiled for each category, and a comprehensive fundraising approach has been developed to secure the required funds.

By achieving the outlined objectives and goals, the New Scout Headquarters at Scotland Park will not only serve as a central hub for scouting activities but also contribute to the broader community, creating a lasting and positive impact on the Haslemere South area.

PROJECT BRIEF

1st Haslemere Scout Group New Headquarters At Scotland Park, Haslemere

Project Overview

The New Scout Headquarters at Scotland Park, Haslemere, is a community-focused project aimed at establishing a dedicated headquarters for the 1st Haslemere Scout Group. This facility will be situated on approximately 8 acres of woodland, generously provided by the housing developer, Redwood (South West) Ltd., as freehold land. The land will be owned by the 1st Haslemere Scout Group and held in trust by the Scouts Association Trust Corporation, ensuring its long-term benefit for the scouts in Haslemere.

Location

The project site is strategically located adjacent to new houses in Scotland Park, Haslemere, providing a tranquil and accessible setting for the scout headquarters. The woodland backdrop aligns with the values of scouting and offers an ideal environment for various scouting activities.

Project Objectives

- 1. Establish a dedicated and functional headquarters for the 1st Haslemere Scout Group.
- 2. Construct the "Shell & Core" of the building, with Redwood (South West) Ltd. responsible for this phase.
- 3. Manage and fund the "second fix" of the building, including the installation of features to make the facility operational and fit for purpose.
- 4. Provide a versatile community hall for local groups and residents in the Haslemere South area and the wider community.

Building Features

The shell and core will include the fundamental structural elements of the building.

The second fix will encompass the installation of utilities, fixtures, and finishes necessary for the headquarters to be fully operational.

The building is designed to meet the specific needs of the 1st Haslemere Scout Group, ensuring it serves as an effective hub for scouting activities.

resources for the project.

community engagement among Haslemere's youth.

The community hall component will offer a shared space for various local groups, enhancing social cohesion

Timeline

Construction of the "Shell & Core" by Redwood (South West) Ltd. with the building & land transferred to the

Scouts by the 80th occupation on the Scotland Park housing development development.

Second fix and building customisation by 1st Haslemere Scout Group starting no later than 3 months after the

transfer of ownership and completing within 18 months.

Expected Project Completion: 2027-2028
